The intention of the festival was also to bring to New York several of the leading film-makers themselves, so that we could have first hand information on what's hap-pening in Cuban cinema. Primer for Film-Making," by Kenneth H. Roberts and Win Sharples, Jr. (Published by Peg-asus, New York. 550 pages. Price: \$12.50.)
