

JOAN JONAS An Environment and Four Events

Joan Jonas's art is one of haunting and mysterious beauty. Her interest in magic and theatricality are combined with formal visual concerns in a body of work that incorporates sculpture, performance, video, film, drawing, and dance. This exhibition is a five-part program which includes: Stage Sets, an environment created expressly for the Institute; the Philadelphia premiere of her performance Mirage on Friday, December 3; a screening of her films on Tuesday, December 7; the presentation of The Juniper Tree, a new performance work for children on Saturday, December 11; and continuous daily showings of her

Jonas combines simple elements such as paper, wood, blackboards, mirrors, and light to create the environment Stage Sets in the Institute's large gallery. On the opening night of the exhibition, this environment will become the setting for the Philadelphia premiere of Mirage. Although trained as a sculptor, Jonas was one of the first artists to investigate the creative potential of performance. In the mid-sixties, at a time when she found the medium of sculpture too confining, she saw a dance concert at the Judson Church. The impact of this performance prompted her to move into an area somewhere between dance, painting, sculpture, and music. She then began to use elements from all these disciplines; her performances combine movement with exotic masks, costumes, various props, sounds, video, and film to explore themes of identity, perception of space, and transmittal of information. Performed in the peculiar blue atmosphere cast by television light, *Mirage* is a series of vignettes, which employ singing, shaking, drawing, video, and projected film in a ritual created to externalize inner visions. Jonas has said, "The experience of *Mirage*" is to be continuously in the present, participating with the performer in a process of game-playing which allows survival and permits passage on a path with no beginning and no end."

Jonas's gifted work with young people led the Institute to invite her to create a new performance for its children's program. A narrative based on a fairy tale, *The Juniper Tree* is perhaps the first performance created by an artist expressly for children.

A substantial portion of Jonas's work is composed of videotapes and films. They chronicle her investigation of space and perception as well as the exploration of her various personae, such as the beguiling Organic Honey or the howling dog. In her videotapes she exploits the distinct features of television; for example, she transforms a vertical roll, the technical term for that disturbing black bar continually rising across the screen during faulty reception, into a positive rhythmic element in the tape appropriately called *Vertical Roll*. Like her performance images, her video and film images are beautiful, thoughtful, and complex.
